

Dr. Marion Wilson Superintendent District 31 - NYCDOE



Dr. Marion Wilson has been in education for over 23 years and has worked for the NYC Department of Education for the past 16 years. She believes in excellence and educational equity. She is committed to ensuring that all students can achieve their full potential in order to succeed beyond the K-12 system. In her current role as Superintendent for District 31 in Staten Island, New York she supports the district and school teams with her expertise in instructional leadership, strategic data analysis, evaluative feedback, equity initiatives, and organizational and systems thinking. District 31 comprises 72 community schools and 12 early childhood centers (3k and Prek) serving Kindergarten – 12th grade with approximately 55,000 students.

Prior to her current role, Dr. Wilson started as Gifted & Talented teacher in East Orange, NJ in 1999, then Literacy Coach at the Harlem Children's Zone, and the longest serving Principal of the Jackie Robinson School in Crown Heights, Brooklyn, NY for eight wonderful years. She is an Adjunct Assistant Professor for the City University of New York and has authored publications.

During her tenure as principal, the Jackie Robinson (Brooklyn, NY) school received several accolades including a N.Y.S. Proclamation from former State Senator Eric Adams acknowledging the school's removal from the persistently failing state designation to a school in good standing with dramatically increased test scores and an A+ rating. Her success story was highlighted in two books written by Alan Blankstein entitled, Failure is Not an Option [Second edition] and The Answer is in the Room.

Dr. Wilson received her Doctorate in Education in Educational and Organizational Leadership from the University of Pennsylvania (UPENN); a Masters of Science from Mercy College, NY; a Masters of Science from Pace University, NY; and a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology from Hofstra University, NY.

She was a Plenary Panelist at the American Federation of Teachers Convention and a Fellow in the Teachers College Columbia University Cahn Fellowship Program. In her ongoing work she is collaborating with The College of Staten Island, New York City Department of Education District 31 Borough Field Office and the PS45 school community to create and pilot a teacher residency program that teaches current mentors and future teachers to strive for racial equity.

Christine has served as an advisor to support the leadership at the District and City level. She was selected by the former New York City Executive Superintendent Anthony Lodico to present at the 2019 Courageous Conversation Summit, and has incorporated the practices of the Courageous Conversation About Race Protocol into her former school community. She expanded on her leadership experience serving on NYC Chancellor Carranza and NYC Chancellor Porters Principal Advisory Council. Most recently she is part of the Developing Leaders and Learners for Professional and Academic Excellence EdPacesetters Cohort III. Where she is working with the Central Leadership Team to engage in a capstone project supporting Chancellor Banks Four Pillars: 1-Scale, sustain, and restore what works. 2-Reimagine the school experience so that youth are excited about coming to school. 3-Prioritize student health & wellness and measure its impact on student success. 4-Intentional Engagement with parents, families, and communities.
